Department Information

The South Milwaukee Fire Department is an all-risk, all-hazard department that provides fire suppression, rescue and emergency medical services to an estimated 20,795 residents who reside within an area of 4.78 sq. miles. In addition, we respond on a mutual aid basis to any community as part of the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS). Starting this year our department joined the Shared Services of Milwaukee County Fire Departments. This is a reciprocal agreement program with the surrounding communities providing specific number of personnel on equipment to specific fire ground incidents. In return, these communities respond to our city when requested as part of this reciprocal agreement.

Off-duty personnel are notified when staffing levels at the station fall below a pre-established minimum or when the department responds to a report of an emergency incident that will require additional personnel to mitigate.

Emergency Medical Services Report


Fire department-based Emergency Medical Services (EMS) continues to be a major part of our response profile. The central location of the fire station allows for minimal response times of specialized equipment and well-trained personnel. By utilizing a flexible staffing model, the South Milwaukee Fire Department is able to provide emergency care to the Paramedic level on any given call. Citizens in South Milwaukee benefit from a high level of service when requesting emergency medical care. [This year we saw over a 4.27% increase in EMS calls.](#)

Training Report

The Training Bureau is managed by the Department Training Officer, Captain Craig Boschke, whose primary responsibility is to develop, organize and schedule training for all department members. Each Fire Lieutenant delivers the scheduled training topics to their shift members daily. The department's firefighters/EMTs and firefighters/Paramedics are fully trained to operate all apparatus and equipment. Due to this unique cross-staffing format, training topics must be well-rounded and comprehensive. Our members are continuously challenged to maintain proficiency in their duties. Throughout 2022, the department's members participated in various fire and emergency medical services training sessions. The overall training goal is to provide all members with opportunities to enhance their knowledge and abilities, so they can confidently and effectively fulfill the mission of the South Milwaukee Fire Department.

As a participating agency of the Milwaukee County Shared Services, the South Milwaukee Fire Department must keep abreast of the operational updates the Shared Services Operations Committee set forth. The South Milwaukee Fire Department's training includes periodic review of the Shared Services standard operating guidelines.

These written documents provide operational guidance for various incidents, including response to fire alarms, structure fires, vehicle crashes, natural gas leaks, carbon monoxide emergencies, and other emergencies. One related area we focused on for hands-on training during 2022 was structure fire water supply. It is typical for neighboring (Shared Service) agencies to be tasked with water supply operations at a structure fire scene. South Milwaukee Fire Department members practiced specific procedures for supplying water from hydrants to fire apparatus at the scene of a structure fire.

As boating season approached, the South Milwaukee Fire Department rescue boat was readied for all responses. Annual training included a general review of onboard technology, including electronic navigation, radar, down-scanning sonar, thermal imaging search camera, and marine communications equipment. Fire department members also practiced their boat operating skills on Lake Michigan when staffing levels and weather conditions allowed. Rescue boat responses commonly occur during unfavorable weather conditions or low visibility, and our boat operators must practice handling in varying water/weather conditions. The South Milwaukee Fire Department typically receives calls for service to assist stranded boaters, search for missing boaters, medical emergencies, and other water-related situations. Our rescue boat remains in a ready state at the South Milwaukee Yacht Club throughout the boating season.

The fire department's aerial ladder truck (Truck 161) returned from an extensive refurbishment project at Pierce Manufacturing in early May. The ten-month refurbishment resulted in many upgrades to the truck's aerial ladder, fire pump, and lighting systems. Fire department members assisted with re-organizing the truck's compartment tool and equipment storage before completing an in-depth review of its functioning systems.

Necessary training included behind-the-wheel driving sessions, aerial ladder operations, and pumping scenarios. The truck officially returned to full service once the refresher training was completed.

During the fall 2022, fire department members participated in hands-on vehicle extrication training. Several “scrap” training vehicles were utilized for the sessions, which allowed the firefighters to operate our assortment of pneumatic, hydraulic, and powered vehicle crash tools. Crews reviewed the proper use of devices for stabilizing and lifting rolled-over vehicles and extrication techniques for trapped vehicle crash victims. Most training sessions focused on hazard awareness for modern electric-powered and alternative-fueled vehicles. The president of Jefferson Fire & Safety, a Middleton-based fire equipment vendor, provided instruction. Brew City Towing provided multiple training vehicles.

Finally, department members participated in required training to maintain emergency medical services (EMS) licensure. Most continuing EMS education is organized and administered by the Milwaukee County Office of Emergency Management (OEM).

Year-round training modules include monthly case study reviews, protocol updates, educational podcasts, written exams/quizzes, and practical skills simulation labs. Much of our EMS training reflects on the ever-changing healthcare trends across local, state, and national levels. In 2022, all fire department members also received training for two OEM-administered EMS studies that involved the fire departments throughout Milwaukee County. One study evaluates the quality of airway ventilation during cardio/respiratory arrest resuscitations to improve airway management during pre-hospital care. The second, Pediatric Dose Optimization for Seizures in Emergency Medical Services (PediDOSE) study, is an emergency medicine study designed to evaluate if a standardized method for paramedics to administer seizure medication leads to the timely delivery of the correct dose. This study aims to simplify how paramedics give medication to seizing children and decrease the number of children actively having seizures when they arrive at the emergency department. By replacing complicated dose calculations with age-based standardized dosing, medical researchers aim to increase the number of children who receive the right amount of seizure-stopping treatment before arriving at the hospital.



Grant Awards and Fundraiser

Grants and community partnerships are of paramount importance in the fire service, as they serve as the backbone of enhanced safety, preparedness, and community engagement. Grants provide essential financial resources to fire departments, enabling them to acquire advanced equipment, implement critical training programs, and improve their overall efficiency and effectiveness in responding to emergencies. These funds are instrumental in maintaining up-to-date technology and equipment, crucial for both firefighter safety and effective emergency response. Furthermore, community partnerships play a pivotal role in building trust and cooperation between fire departments and the neighborhoods they serve. Collaborations with local businesses, schools, and community organizations help create a more resilient and informed citizenry. These partnerships often result in community-based initiatives like fire safety education programs, disaster preparedness, and community outreach, fostering a sense of unity and shared responsibility in addressing fire-related challenges. Together, grants and community partnerships fortify the vital role of the fire service in safeguarding lives and property, highlighting the invaluable synergy between public resources and community involvement in ensuring a safer, more resilient community.




Public Education / Community Outreach Report

The pandemic continued to force us to place on hold much of our public education and community outreach activities. The South Milwaukee Fire Department continues to pride itself on a very active and quite interactive presence in the community. We were able to provide fire extinguisher training for a local business and a High School Tech Ed class. We anticipate we will be back in full swing with our programs in 2022.

While our belief is that fire safety deserves year-round emphasis, our philosophy remains that it needs to start early on, building strong foundations in education. Each fall, students in the local schools are visited by our firefighters. Elementary students in kindergarten and 1st grade are provided with fire safety programs during the annual National Fire Prevention Week in October. When students reach the 5th grade, they are provided with a more advanced Fire Safety Program that focuses on preparation for their adolescent years and the importance of home/fire safety. The 5th graders are assigned take home projects, where family involvement is encouraged. The students are also taught general home safety, such as general first aid and burn care, as many of the children are reaching babysitting age.

Fire Inspection Report

Fire inspection duties are completed by shift members assigned to each of the three shifts and are conducted during their regular duty day. This arrangement often presents a formidable scheduling challenge due to an increased call volume, ever-increasing training requirements, and other obligations to our community.

FF/P Jeremy Fronczak, FF/EMT Jason Helmlinger and FF/EMT Kevin Schneider, who are State of Wisconsin Certified Fire Inspectors, each conduct fire safety code inspections in accordance with Chapter 27 - *Fire Prevention, Protection, and Control* of the City's Municipal Code and the State of Wisconsin Administrative Code, Chapter SPS314, which adopts NFPA 1 as the "official" fire prevention code of the State. Ultimately, these efforts are overseen by the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services. The Inspection Bureau also works in close cooperation with the City's Building Inspection and Health Departments to address other health and safety code violation matters that impact the quality of life for the residents of and visitors to the City of South Milwaukee. FF/EMT Kevin Schneider is tasked to oversee inspections of new and modified sprinkler systems on all inspectable properties within the City, based on a change within the Wisconsin code requiring inspectors to have extra training during their schooling.



Response Trends

To properly understand the numbers provided on this page, one must understand that the categorizing of incident responses is subject to both the efforts of the person writing the report and the methods used to identify the appropriate code assigned to an incident. Greater emphasis has been placed on more accurately identifying an exact category rather than using a generic "Other", thus providing a more accurate *snapshot* of our response trends. In addition, while a single incident may fit into several categories (Cooking Fire & Smoke Removal, for example) only the primary Incident Type is counted.

¹To better track our responses to motor vehicle crashes and water-related incidents, these responses have been separated from the "Service / Good Intent" category since 2017.
