Hello and thank you to the citizens of South Milwaukee. Your continued support of SMPD is very much appreciated this year. Thank you very, very much. Also, thank you to the Officers, Dispatchers and Clerks at SMPD who keep working hard at their jobs, doing what they can to serve the citizens of our community and keeping it safe!

We did add some new members to the SMPD family this year. Welcome Officers Derek Dosedla, Scott Cholewinski, Mariah Neuharth and Tanner Knaak! These young officers have already demonstrated the desire for public service and displayed excellent attitude toward police work. We have also added Dispatcher Melissa Slapczynski and Clerk Kim Vukovich to the family. Welcome Lisa and Kim! They acclimated quickly to their jobs and are doing great work.

This year continued the developing trend of petty theft, mostly committed by non-residents of South Milwaukee. Our community, like others in the Milwaukee area, have had to deal with subjects coming to our city, committing crimes and then leaving. Suburban police departments have gotten much better at sharing information, which has led to several arrests in these types of cases. Fortunately, violent crime remains very low for South Milwaukee – so low that no crime patterns exist for violent crime in our community.

Community Policing remains a very high priority for the South Milwaukee Police Department. Once again, SMPD held its Annual Community Night Out, Shop with a Cop and the DARE Golf Outing, along with many other events. Officers continue making efforts to conduct traffic enforcement and foot patrols of businesses and schools.

And now.... you know what's coming... My Broken Record Plea! Get involved! If you see something, say something! If something doesn't seem right, call SMPD and ask for us to check it out. The best way for citizens to assist the police in staying safe is to keep valuables out of sight and out of vehicles, when not necessary. Please, please, please.... lock your cars and houses! This has shown to reduce the chances you become a victim of theft by 80 - 90%! Other ways to assist include use and sharing of surveillance video and social media activity - even simply taking note of suspicious activity. Most criminal activity is witnessed by someone whether or not they recognized it at the time it occurred.

A Letter From the Administration & Services Commander

Accreditation

The Communications Center handled over 26,000 events in 2023. Four full-time, two part-time, and several substitute dispatchers are responsible for all incoming calls to the police department, all radio transmissions for police and fire, and all 911 emergency calls. We faced several personnel changes in 2023. Roberta Plachinski who worked as a dispatcher for over 27 years for our department, retired in the first month of 2024. Our dispatch operations will be moving over to the City of Oak Creek in 2025, as we are consolidating dispatch centers. In 2024, our dispatch center will continue to provide the best emergency services and customer service to the community.

The Investigations Section is comprised of a lieutenant, two school liaison officers and three investigators, including one member who is assigned to the Milwaukee Metropolitan Drug Enforcement Group. The liaison officers are assigned to the South Milwaukee High School and the South Milwaukee Middle School but they also spend time in the elementary schools, teaching the DARE program.

The Records Department is comprised of two full-time clerks and one part-time clerk. The records section is open Monday through Friday 7am-6pm and is closed on the weekends and holidays. The records section handles hundreds of records requests, as well as winter parking permits and the collection of fines and payments.

The Internal Affairs section investigates citizen complaints. There was one incident in 2023, where a department member was found in violation of department policy.

As members of the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group (WILEAG), we go through a full accreditation process every three years. I am happy to announce that the South Milwaukee PD accreditation team completed the accreditation process, and we were awarded our 9th accreditation in May of 2023.

The hard work and dedication of the sworn and non-sworn members of the Administration and Services Division is admired and appreciated.

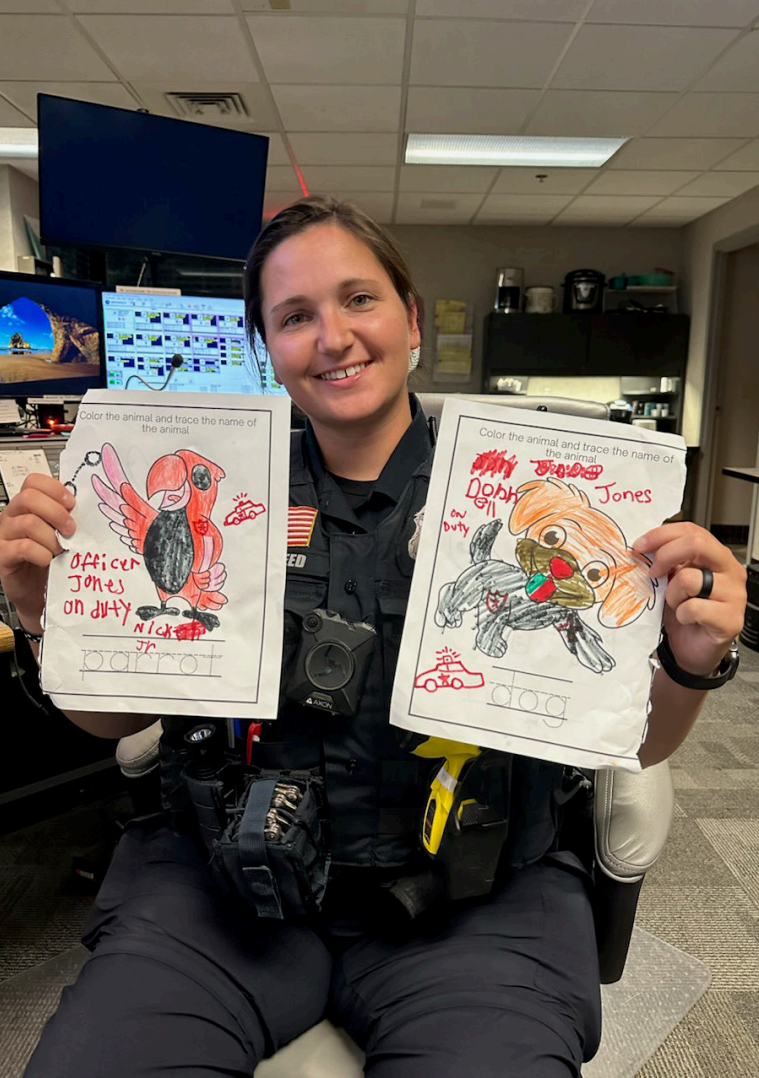

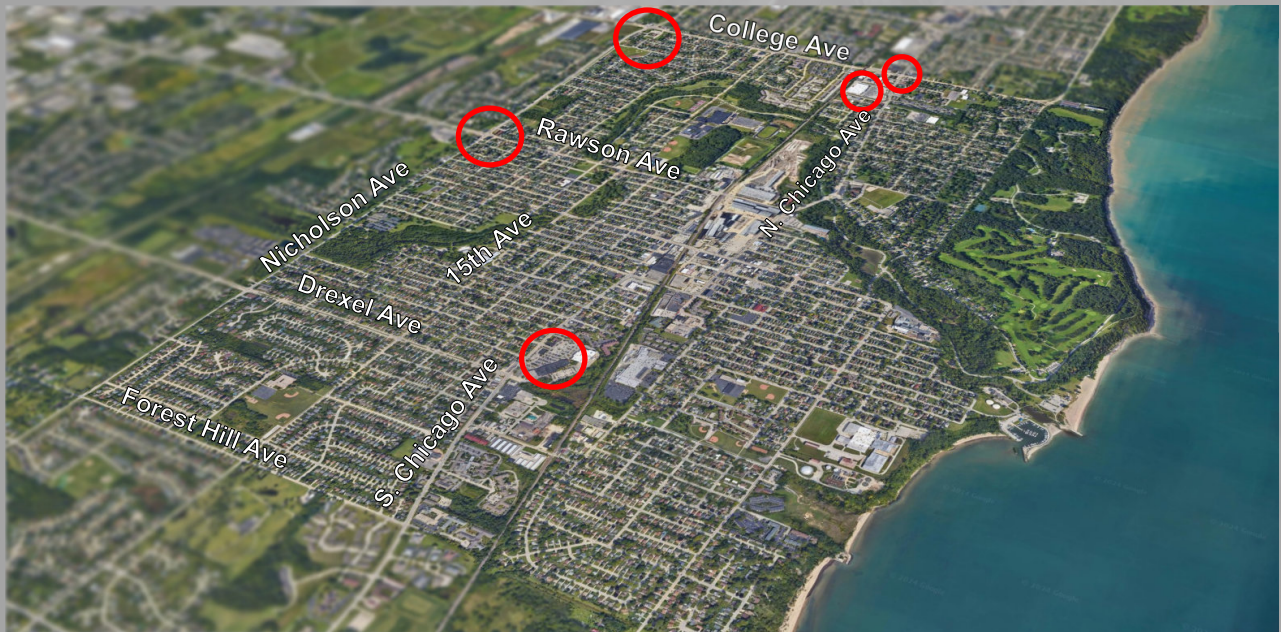
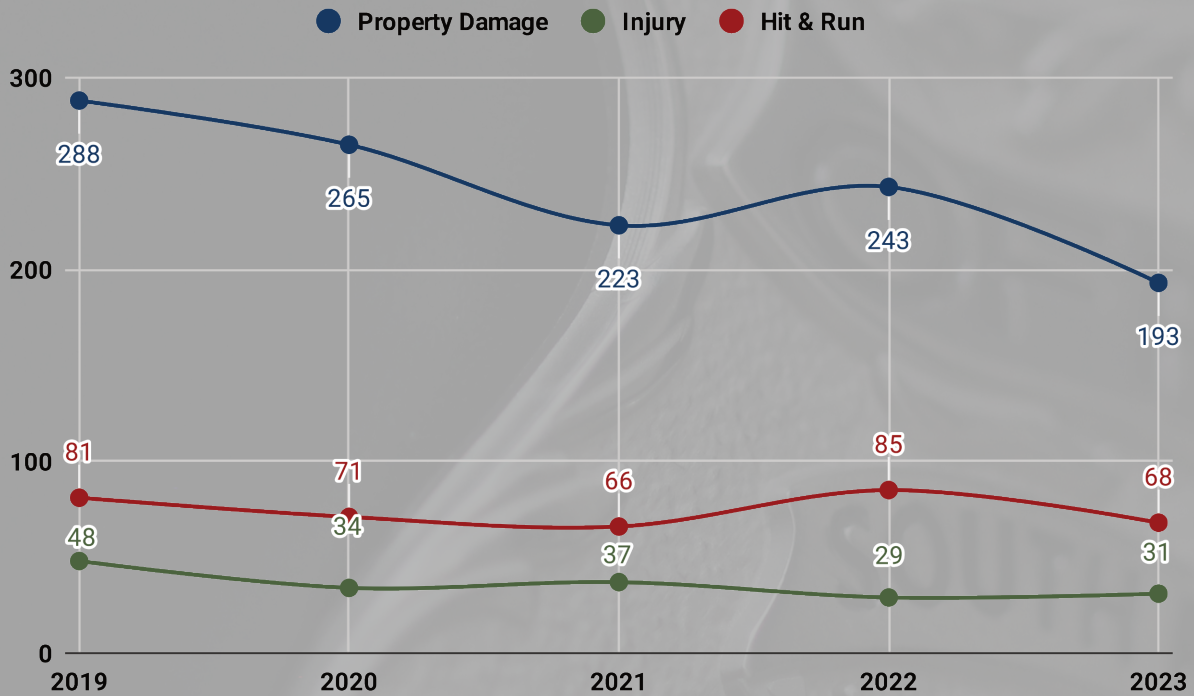






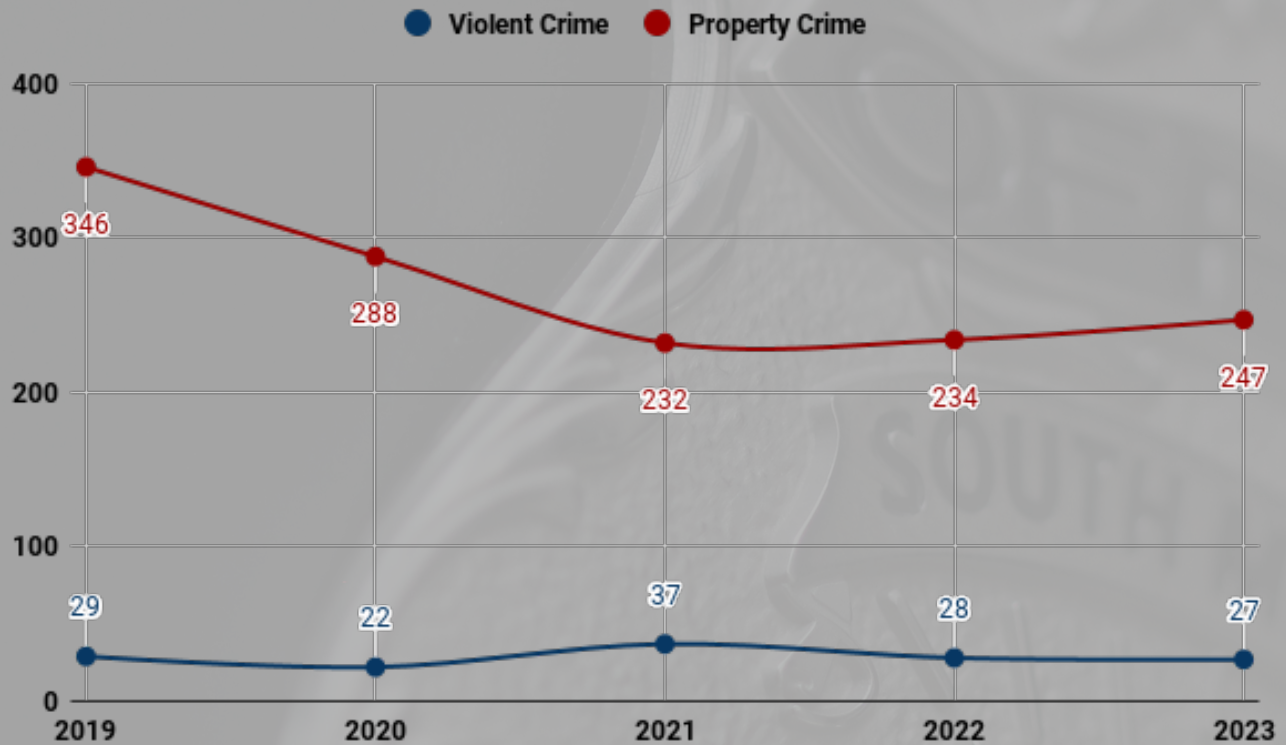


Traffic Crash Statistics



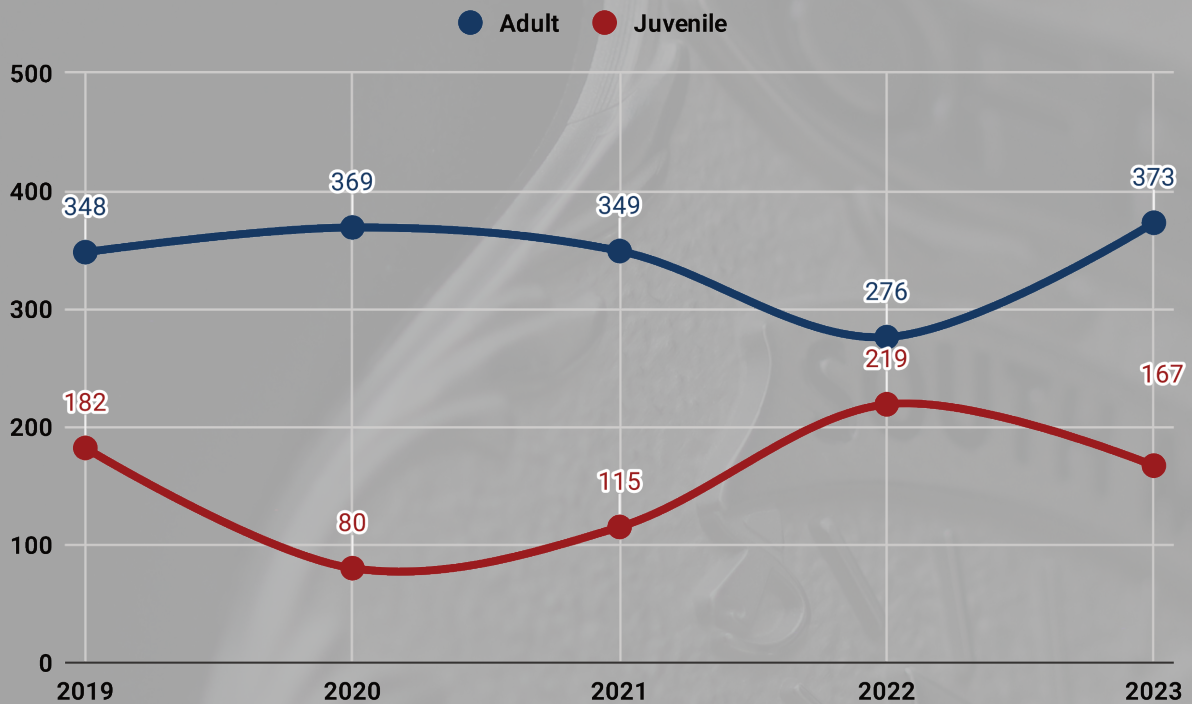

2023 showed a slight increase in Property Crime while Violent Crime remained relatively unchanged.

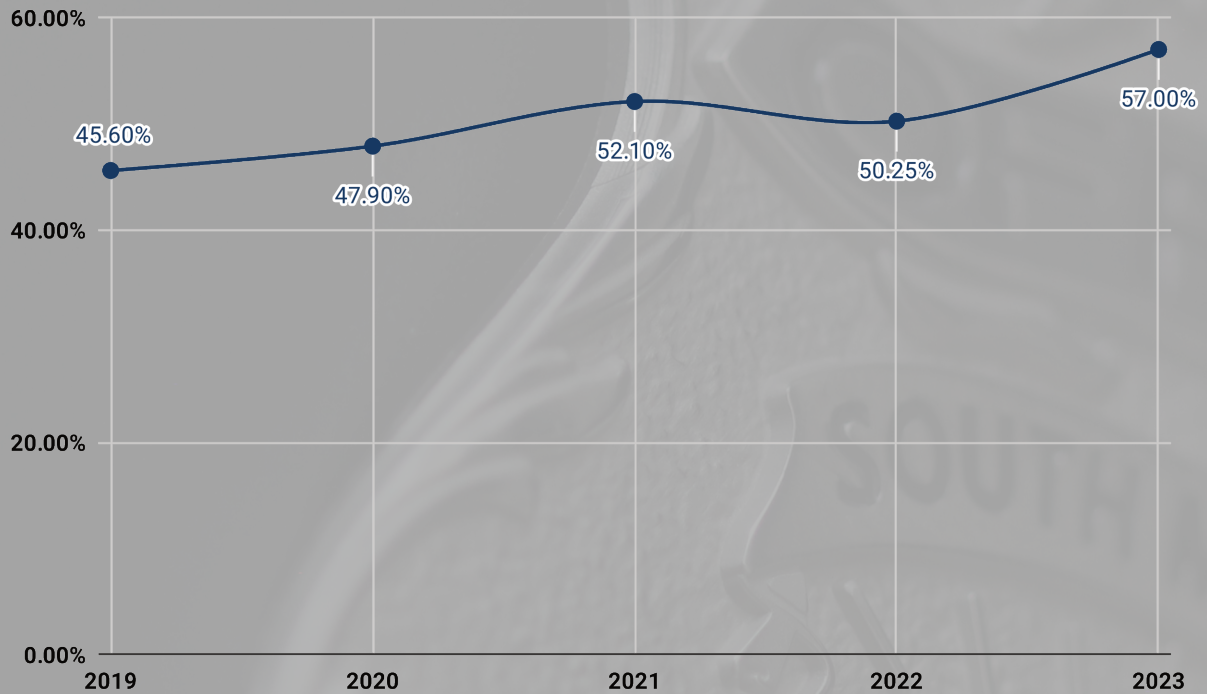
Arrest Statistics



2023 showed an increase of 35% in Adult arrests.

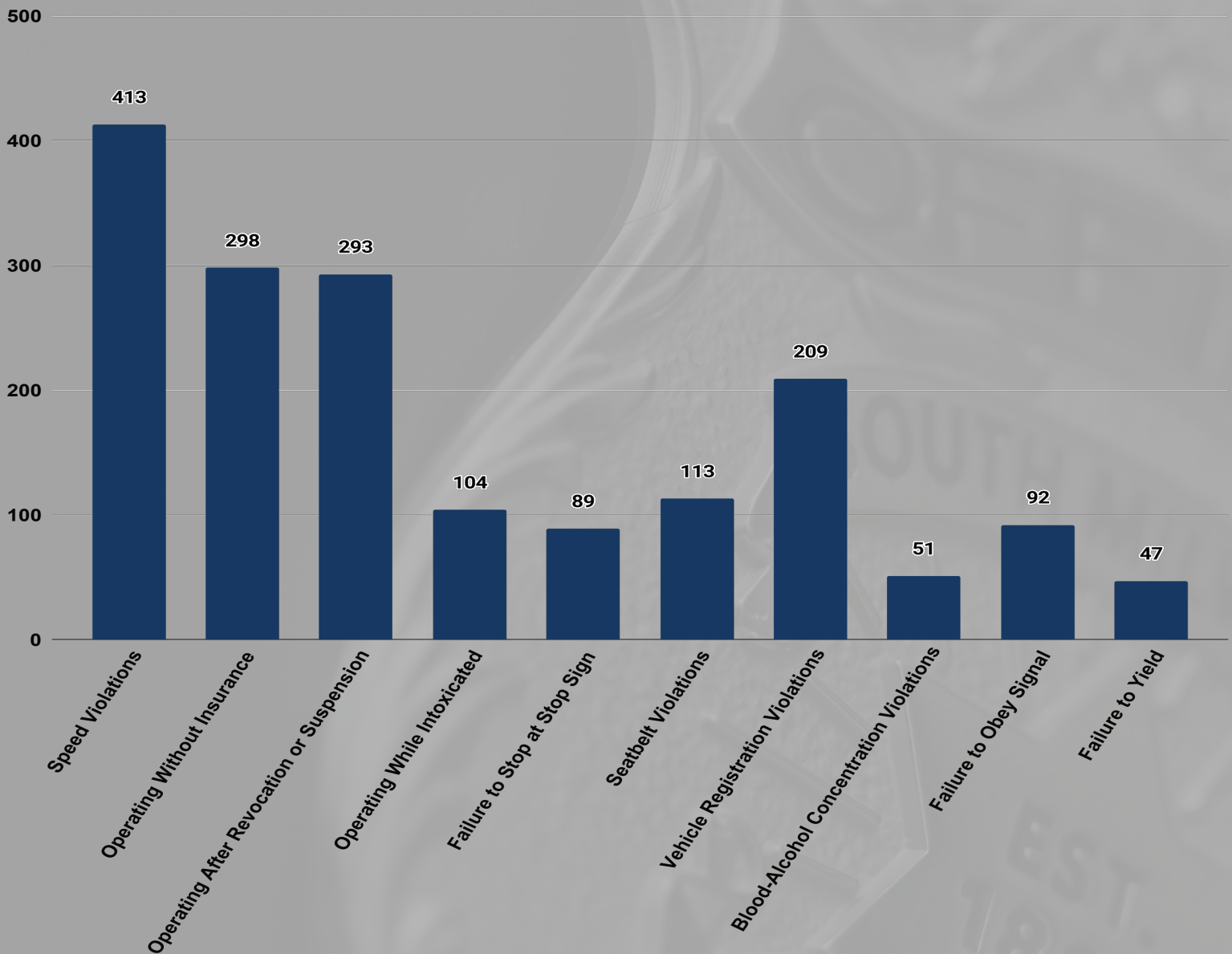
2023 showed a decrease of 24% in Juvenile arrests.

Clearance Rates



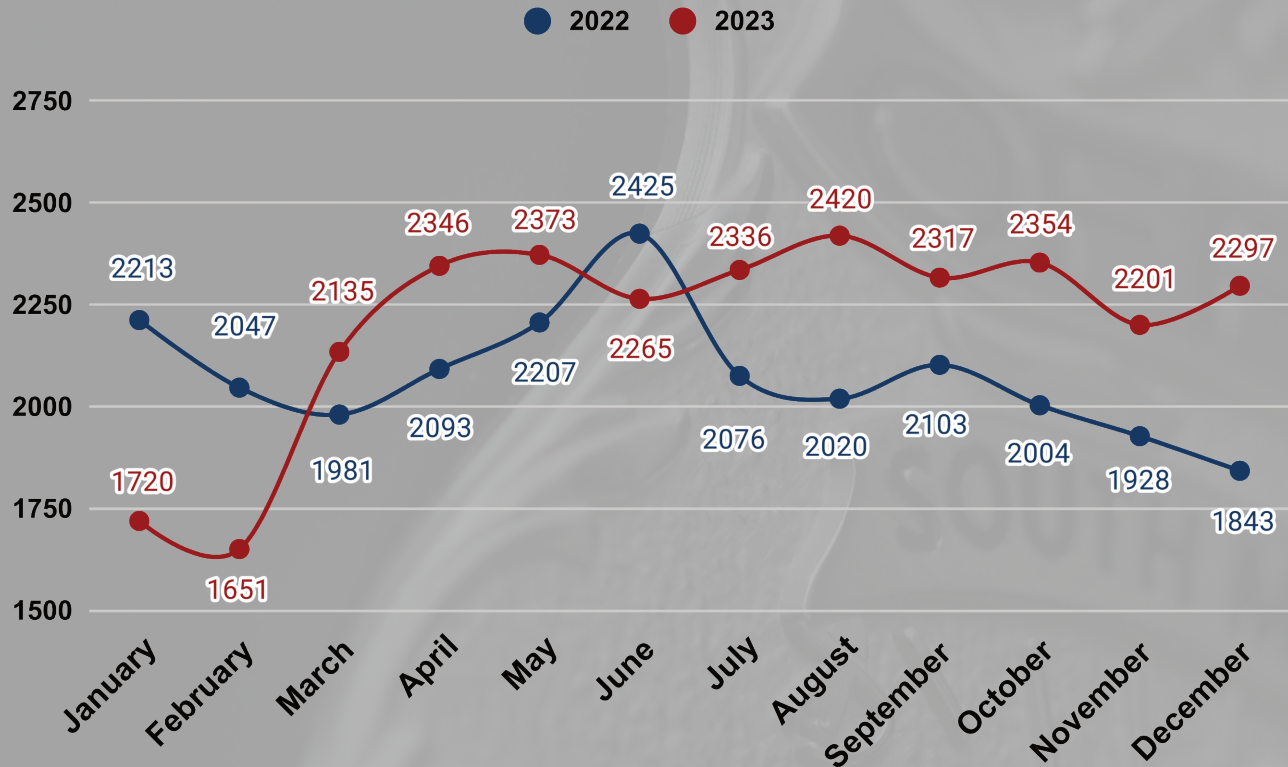
Clearance rates have continued to increase over the past 5 years, with a 7% increase in 2023.

Calls for Service

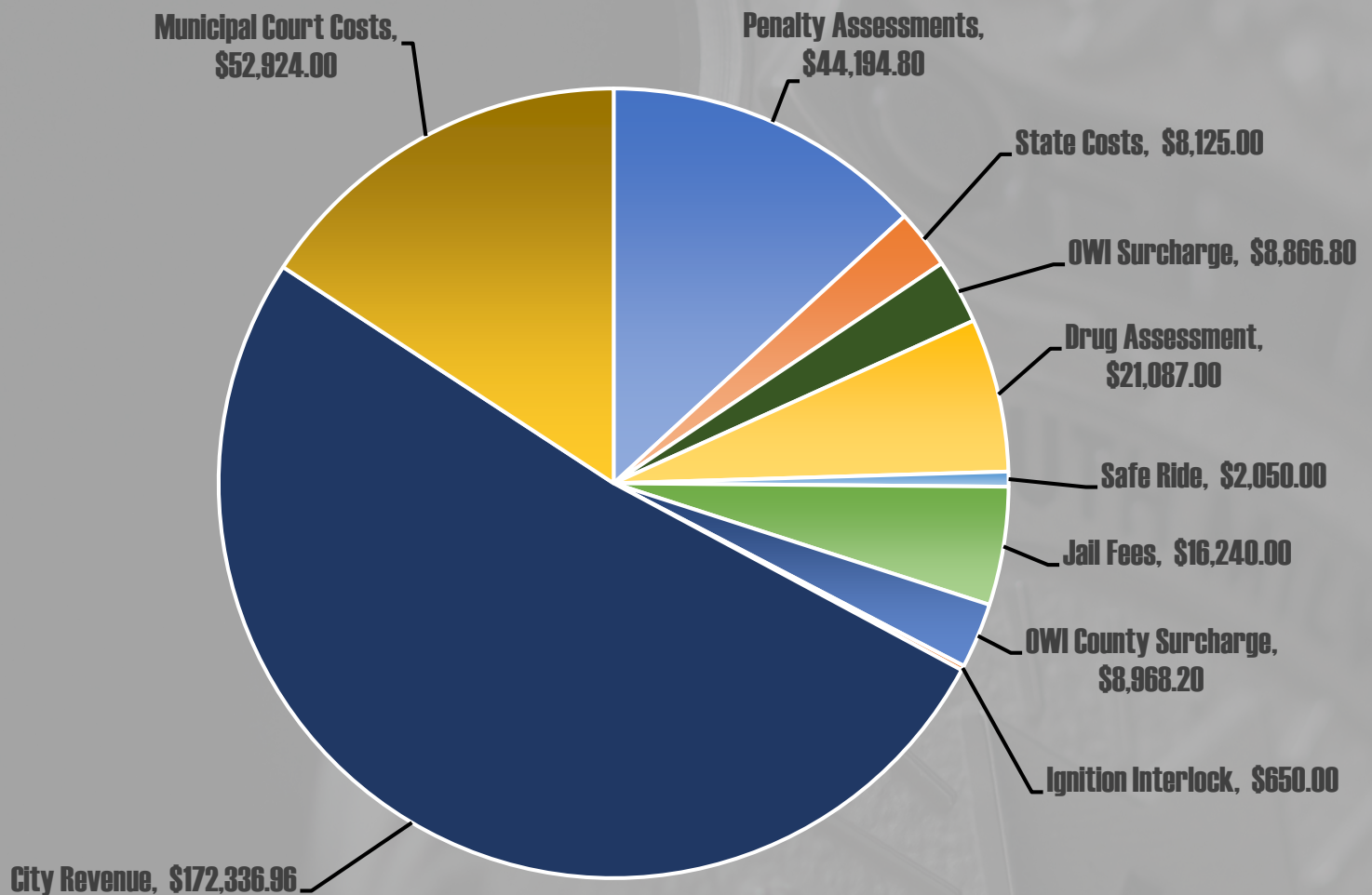

SMPD Training

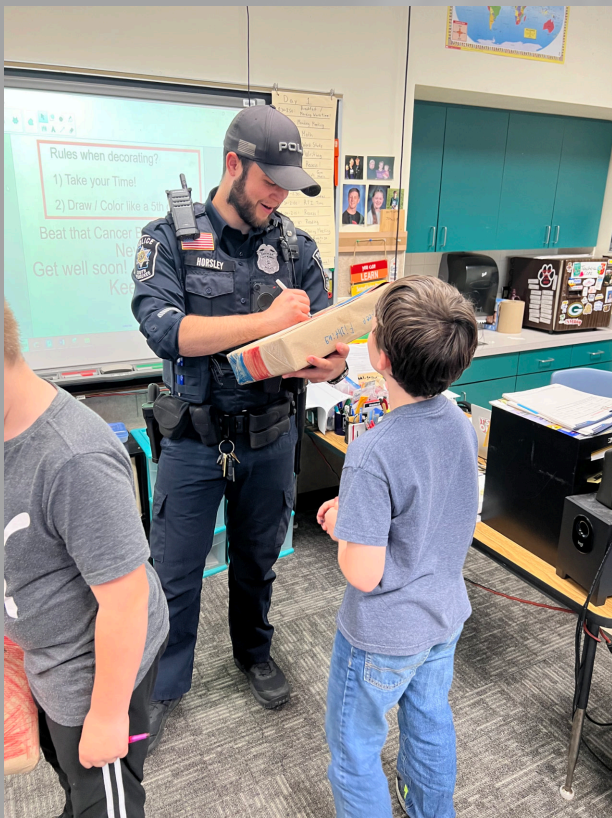

Crime Prevention

The Crime Prevention Unit responds to the diverse needs of our community in many ways, including organizing community policing events, conducting business and residential security surveys, assisting with neighborhood watch groups, and teaching civilian response to active shooter events (CRASE). In 2023, the Crime Prevention Unit organized SMPD's Community Night Out and Shop with a Cop. Crime Prevention Unit Officers also attended several other events, including LionsFest/Heritage Days, to engage with the citizens of the South Milwaukee Community.



South Shore Joint Tactical Unit

The South Shore Joint Tactical Unit is comprised of 36 officers from South Milwaukee, St. Francis and Cudahy PDs. This unit includes, seven Crisis Negotiators, and three Snipers. By combining with the other two communities, we are able to pool our resources and training to develop an effective team.

The purpose of the unit is to serve search warrants and respond to critical incidents, such as barricaded subjects and hostage situations. During 2023, the SSJTU served 12 search warrants and had one critical incident which involved an armed barricaded subject, who initially shot a firearm out of his residence. It ended peacefully with the subject surrendering.

The South Milwaukee Police Department is proud to introduce Rocket, our first K-9 in 20 years. K-9 Rocket is a year and a half old Dutch Shepard. He was born in Hungary and flown to the United States in September of 2023. Rocket and K-9 Handler Matthew Edwards completed a 5 week intense training program at Jessiffany Canine Services school in November of 2023 and are now serving the community together. Rocket is trained in narcotics detection, article detection, tracking, criminal apprehension, and handler protection. Rocket and Officer Edwards continue to train a minumum of 16 hours each month and look forward to being a new resource for South Milwaukee Police Department and the community.
