

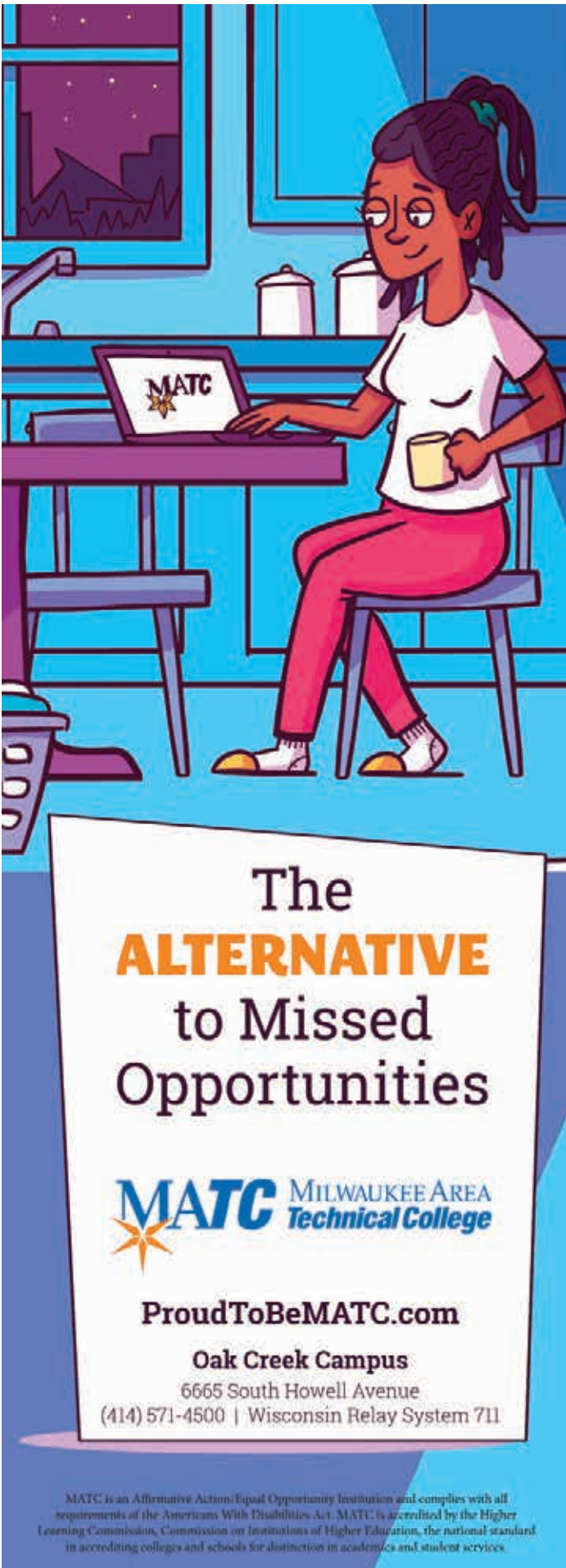

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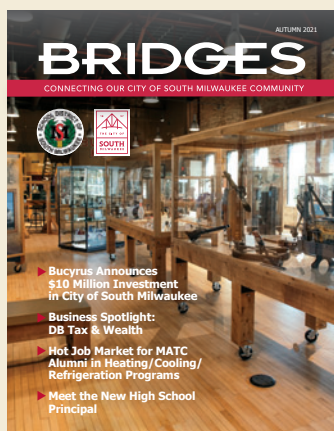

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## ► Bucyrus Foundation Announces Historic \$10 Million Investment in City of South Milwaukee

### 10-Year Commitment To Fund Downtown Redevelopment, Schools, Public and Greenspaces, and Nonprofits

**T**he Bucyrus Foundation is making a generational, legacy-ensuring investment in the City it called home for almost 120 years.

On Thursday, September 9, the Foundation announced a \$10 million contribution to many of the institutions that make South Milwaukee uniquely South Milwaukee. The gift will come as a series of annual \$1 million donations over the next decade, and be administered through the City of South Milwaukee and South Milwaukee School District, which will receive \$2 million of the overall contribution.

Funds will build on the Foundation's \$2 million grant in 2020 toward the launch of the Bucyrus Club & Event Center/South Milwaukee Industrial Museum and development of a downtown public gathering space.

The new \$10 million contributions will fund the following:

- Downtown South Milwaukee redevelopment, potentially laying a foundation for the creation of an entity focused on investments in property acquisition and rehabilitation, business attraction and retention, public improvements,

marketing, events and other initiatives aimed at revitalizing South Milwaukee's City Center.

- The South Milwaukee School District, with a focus on investments in athletics, STEM (science, technology, engineering, math). and manufacturing career education.
- Initiatives to help fund City- and Milwaukee County-owned parks and other natural areas like the proposed new downtown South Milwaukee public space, the South Milwaukee War Memorial, Grant Park, the Oak Creek Watershed, and other areas in the City.
- A grant program for South Milwaukee nonprofit organizations, including South Milwaukee Human Concerns, a significant recipient of Bucyrus support prior to the sale of the company in 2011.

"Since we announced our gift for the Bucyrus Club and public space in 2020, we have been looking for 'what's next'? And we wanted 'what's next' to be a lasting investment in the City we embraced for a century, and that embraced us. This is it," Foundation Chairman and former Bucyrus President Tim Sullivan proudly states. "We couldn't be

more excited to step up in this way to help the residents, business owners and students of South Milwaukee. South Milwaukee's success was always our success, and we are proud to honor that legacy with this donation."

The Bucyrus Foundation has approved the contribution. Says South Milwaukee Mayor Erik Brooks: "This is a historic day in our City. These funds will have lasting impact across South Milwaukee and will further strengthen the legacy of this storied company in our City. We could not deliver South Milwaukee's promising future without partners like Tim and the Bucyrus Foundation, and we can not thank them enough for their generosity. We are excited to start strategically investing these funds."

According to South Milwaukee School Superintendent Jeff Weiss: "We are honored the Foundation chose our local schools as one of the key recipients of this contribution. Tim and the Foundation understand the importance of education to the future of South Milwaukee, the state and the country, and we share that commitment. We look forward to working with them to invest these funds and lift up our students, staff and community."

# ► Bucyrus Is Back in South Milwaukee



## Bucyrus Club and Bucyrus Commons Update

In partnership with the Bucyrus Foundation, the City of South Milwaukee acquired the property at 1919 12th Avenue in early 2020. This former machine shop, that was reconfigured as a Bucyrus employee club, has now been renovated as the Bucyrus Club & Event Center. The Skyline Catering deli is open for breakfast and lunch on the first floor, and the Bucyrus Museum is open on the second floor.

The renovated Bucyrus Club captures many of the building's historic, original features along with modern upgrades to make it one of the most unique event venues in the area.

The ground floor includes two ballrooms, an outdoor patio and a couple of smaller event/meeting rooms. The 1893 ballroom was once home to Bucyrus' steam engineer assembly bay. The room's Cream City brick, cast iron beam supports, and rough sawn ceiling were kept as highlights of the space. The Grand Ballroom, once home to a machine shop, features a timber A-frame structure that once held two drive shafts and a crane rail for the machine tools. The shovels that made the Panama Canal were made right here.

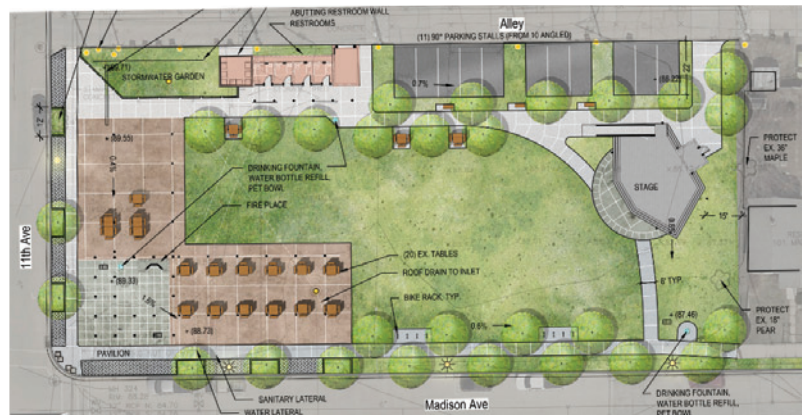
Dozens of events have already been scheduled at the facility in 2021 and 2022, with many patrons from outside the City, as the Club promises to be a major attraction for people from across the region. To accommodate the venue's popularity, Skyline Catering has expanded from 10 employees (in 2020) to 32 employees in 2021.

The Bucyrus Museum occupies 5,500 square feet on the building's second floor. The museum's collection includes almost 20,000 items associated with the nearly 120-year history of Bucyrus in South Milwaukee.

This project includes many stakeholders that contributed to its success. A special thank you goes to project manager and former South Milwaukee Mayor David Kieck, as well as the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation for a generous \$250,000 Community Development Investment grant. Zimmerman Architectural Studios led project design, and CG Schmidt was the general contractor.

### Bucyrus Commons Update

In addition to the Bucyrus Foundation's investment in the Bucyrus Club, it has also contributed to a downtown open space project on the City-owned property at the corner of

11th and Madison Avenues. The site is currently used for the Downtown Market, European Beer Gardens, and as the home of events like Crusherfest, the Festival of Trees, and the South Milwaukee Deer Garden, as hundreds of people gathered for a viewing party to watch the Milwaukee Bucks win the NBA Championship on July 20 (see photo on pg. 28).

After several stakeholder committee meetings and two public surveys, a design concept has been created to include a covered pavilion, an event stage and permanent bathrooms.

In recognition of the Bucyrus Foundation's contribution, the space's name will be "Bucyrus Commons," and design elements will feature Bucyrus history and branding. The project's next steps include a finalized design and transitioning to the construction phase. A grand opening for the space is anticipated in late summer or fall of 2022. 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# ► South Milwaukee Annual Budget By The Numbers

## Providing Direction and Vision for the Future of the Community

**T**he City's annual budget is the single most important document we have for providing direction and vision for the future of the community. It is the blueprint for financial and policy decisions implemented throughout the year.

And while we deal with challenges like state-imposed levy limits, reductions in state aids, and unforeseen expenses like those related to COVID-19, we continue to make necessary investments in bringing to life the City government's mission to deliver exceptional services to ensure a high quality of life and enable growth.

The process to build the next year's budget begins in August, as departments are asked to submit their plans to the administration. After meetings with department heads, the budget continues on to the South Milwaukee Common Council's Finance Committee for consideration. The Administrative Budget is typically published in early

October. Public comment is considered in early November, and the Common Council usually considers passage of the final document later that month.

### State Aids

State aids, our second-largest source of revenue, are down 10.5% since 2003. Shared revenue payments are down 20%.

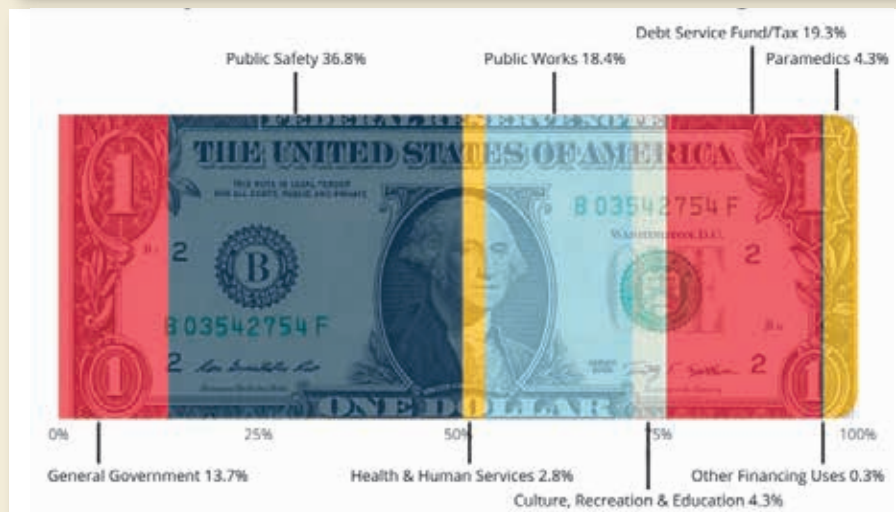
### Your Tax Bill

The tax levy is our largest source of revenue, but it is important to note the City is only one of several taxing jurisdictions that share your annual property tax payment. Although the City collects your entire tax payment, the City only retains 33.76 cents of every tax dollar for City operations. Other entities, such as the School District of South Milwaukee, Milwaukee Area Technical College and Milwaukee County also retain a portion of your annual tax payment.

## Where Do Your Tax Dollars Go?

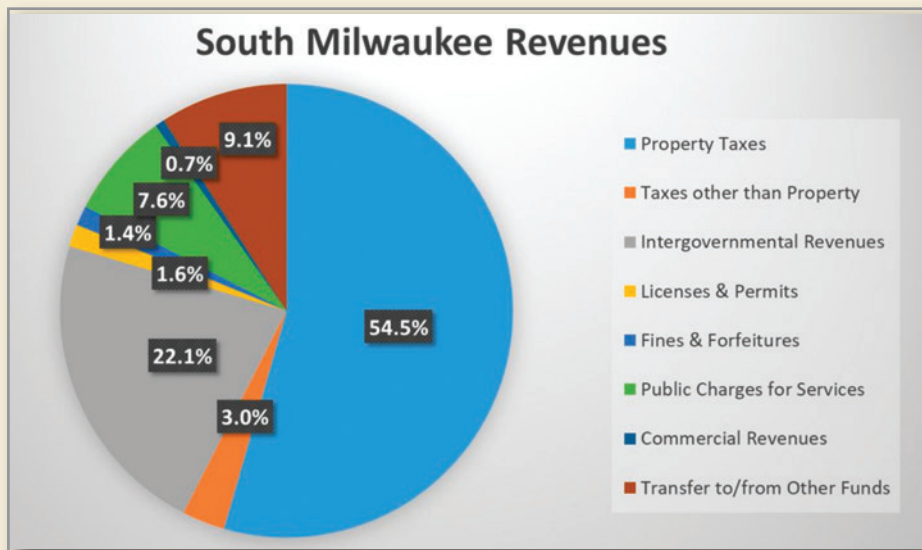
## Funding Our Services: 2021 City Expenditures

We invest money where it is needed most, to deliver the services you have come to expect. Public Safety (police and fire) and Public Works make up more than half of annual expenditures.

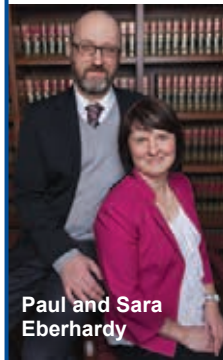


## Balancing the Budget Amid Falling Revenues

South Milwaukee and communities across Wisconsin are struggling to fund their core services, due in part to state-imposed levy limits and declining state aids. These constraints have been with us more than a decade. State aids, our second-largest source of revenue, are down 10.5% since 2003. Shared revenue payments – which make up the biggest portion of aid provided South Milwaukee by the state – are down 20% over that time. Recycling aids have also dropped significantly.



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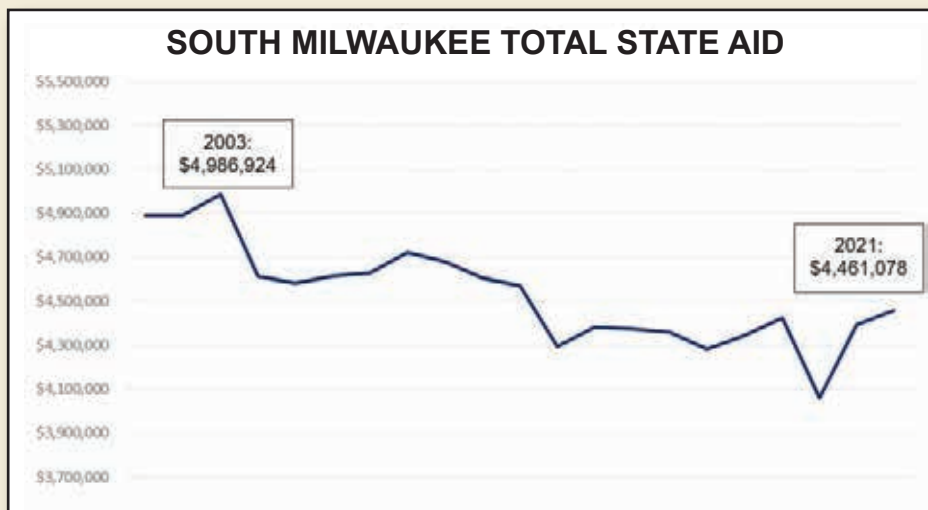

## ► Business Spotlight: DB Tax & Wealth Making an Investment in the South Milwaukee Community

**S**outh Milwaukee is home to a diverse and fascinating collection of companies, including retail stores, restaurants, boutiques and service organizations. One of these businesses is DB Tax & Wealth, a mainstay in the City for more than 30 years. This financial services business is proud to call South Milwaukee its home, especially after making a major investment in the City over the past two years. With an expanded and newly renovated footprint at 1125 Milwaukee Avenue, this vibrant company has positioned itself as a leader in the industry, and is reaping the rewards of its own long-term financial plan and growth.

DB Tax & Wealth had a modest beginning back in 1989, when it was founded by current CEO Lisa Pugel's parents, (the D and B letters were her mother's initials). At the time the business only focused on seasonal tax preparation services. Lisa started working there during high school, and when her parents decided to retire in the early '90s, Lisa purchased the business from them. She began offering additional services, such as small business accounting and investment management, along with tax preparation to create more year-round services for its clients.

In 2015, Lisa made the decision to focus on business development. DB Tax & Wealth first purchased two neighboring properties so they could enlarge their footprint. With that expansion came the hiring of additional personnel, bringing them to 20 total employees at the moment. Lisa is

the majority shareholder, along with her husband, Mark, and two key employees. Lisa's son and daughter are also shareholders, and are working at the firm while earning their financial certifications.

According to Lisa, "Everyone in the City has been so supportive of my vision for DB Tax & Wealth over the years. When I approached our City officials with my ideas of expanding, they immediately got on board and provided me resources to move forward. When you have the backing of the City, you become emotionally invested in the community, and the people who live here and support small businesses. My heart truly belongs to the City of South Milwaukee."

After City approval to purchase the adjoining distressed properties, Lisa put the rest of her plan into action. In addition to office space for DB Tax & Wealth, the newly renovated building is now a \$2 million commercial center

that will serve as a collaborative workspace for other financial agents and attorneys to build their own businesses. The new two-story addition includes an “amazing event space” according to Lisa, where special events and seminars can be held. 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## ▶ HOT JOB MARKET FOR ALUMNI OF MATC'S HEATING/COOLING/REFRIGERATION PROGRAMS

**T**he coronavirus pandemic made people and business owners think more critically about air purity, including heating and air conditioning systems. Industry experts recognize MATC as one of the top schools in the U.S. for training the workforce to install and service air conditioning, refrigeration and heating equipment.

When Roberto Cisneros' employer laid him off after the coronavirus pandemic hit, he didn't waste any time pursuing a new career with stronger opportunities. He enrolled in the Refrigeration, Air Conditioning and Heating Service Technician technical diploma program at the Oak Creek Campus. After graduating in May 2021, he immediately began working in the industry and is now with Burant Heating and Air Conditioning LLC in Franklin.

"When I started the job, they said I was a lot more informed than other new people. They were impressed that I already knew some technical things," Cisneros says.

The college offers a 30-credit technical diploma and a related 64-credit associate in applied science degree; the associate degree credits transfer to partnering four-year colleges. Graduates of both programs are prepared for a career with steady demand.

"The trades are always looking for people, and this is a vast industry that's paying really well," says David Polk, MATC's director of apprenticeship programs.

### Technical Training Can Lead to a 'Clean' Job

Students who excel at assembling puzzles are likely to be a good match for the career because they can envision the finished project before it is installed. They will gain a background in mathematics, drafting, electricity and thermodynamics at MATC.

"There are a lot of 'clean' jobs like building automation that deal more with technology and computer programming rather than hanging ductwork and installing a furnace," says Polk. Some graduates such as Cisneros work in homes while others work on the largest buildings in the region.

Polk also points out that Wisconsin's "temperature swings from very hot to very low make the heating and air conditioning industry all the more important."

The college was named one of the top Air Conditioning (AC) Technician Schools nationwide by the HVAC classes.org blog. The recognition acknowledges the diligent work of college instructors to ensure that MATC's courses meet industry needs.

Cisneros enjoyed his MATC experience. He noted that his instructors had different styles of teaching, which kept the classes interesting and engaging. Instructor Andy Lewis, for example, "would chat with us and give scenarios that happened to him in the field. They used real-life stories during their lectures," Cisneros says.

### **Ready To Repair: MATC Appliance Technicians Are In Demand**

One of the only programs of its kind in the U.S., MATC has one of the few appliance technician programs nationwide. Students learn to truly analyze and understand a situation – and not simply change parts until an appliance returns to

working order. They gain a fundamental understanding of electricity to help them troubleshoot. Students also work on soft skills because they will spend significant time on the job interacting with customers. 2018 graduate Jason Manske. “We try to come in as friendly as possible and always respect their property. 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# Welcome Back Students and Faculty

On behalf of the School District of South Milwaukee, I would like to welcome everyone to the 2021-2022 school year! There are many great things in store for this new season of learning, and I would like to highlight a few of the exciting changes.

South Milwaukee High School has a new principal and a new schedule for the 2021-2022 school year. Mr. Bryan Terry was selected as the new principal for the high school after completing three rounds of

interviews with more than 40 teachers, students, parents and administrators. This is Mr. Terry's tenth year as an administrator. More information about Mr. Terry can be found in an interview with him in this edition of *Bridges* (see pg. 26).

The new high school bell schedule that was approved by the School Board will be implemented this school year. The new schedule is a modified block schedule that will allow courses to be taken over an entire school year. This change will help students prepare for the AP exam, increase enrollment in the performing arts, allow for core subject area classes to continue all year, and add additional face-to-face instructional time to the high school.

The South Milwaukee Middle School is also implementing a new schedule for the 2021-2022 school year. The new middle school schedule will add a 35-minute Homebase period to the school day. This addition, and other changes to the schedule, will allow English and math teachers to fully implement their curriculum, and continue to encourage and embed solid and personalized universal curriculum. Students will have access to all of their core area teachers during Homebase to support their academic needs during the school day. The 35-minute Homebase structure will also allow the middle school to research and implement a flexible tier 1 and/or tier 2 intervention model, as well as continue the District's focus on social/emotional instruction with all students.

At the elementary school level, all-day, four-year-old kindergarten will be available at each school in the District. Blakewood will house both a full- and half-day 4K program. This summer, teams of elementary and secondary teachers met to identify the most essential standards in the areas of reading and math in order to streamline and focus our instruction. Teachers and administrators also met over the summer to continue our work on Professional Learning Communities and equity.

This upcoming school year is filled with exciting opportunities for our students and the community. We thank you for your continued support!

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## Wisconsin State Budget and Federal COVID-19 Act: IMPACT ON SCHOOLS

**T**his past June, with a historic amount of funding available at the state level, our State legislators passed a budget that had a \$0 increase to school revenue limits for the next two years, and included no state relief to help with the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the money that was allocated to schools from the state was added to the mix of money that is capped by the revenue limit. This will reduce property taxes, which is a great thing, but it will do nothing to provide schools with any increase in revenue limit. Thankfully, our leaders at the federal level passed bills both under President Trump and President Biden that provided some one-time funding to assist with the COVID-19 pandemic (more on this later).

The budget passed by our state legislators has significant implications for the future. Schools will need to decide if it is worth spending one-time revenue on ongoing costs, thus creating a fiscal cliff that will need to be dealt with in a few short years. The Federal COVID-19 funding will need to be used in a fashion that it was not intended to be used. It will need to be used to sustain ongoing programs, and schools will be left with less resources to recover from the pandemic. When the federal funding runs out, school districts across Wisconsin will be left to either cut programs or go to their local communities for referendum.

Now, back to the federal funding referenced earlier. South Milwaukee has been allocated \$8,085,068 in federal funding. There is a requirement that 20% of this funding be used on “unfinished teaching and learning,” but at this point the guidelines are still being developed to determine what constitutes unfinished teaching and learning. The proposed plan for South Milwaukee includes items that fall into one of three buckets.

The first is Safety & Mitigation, the second is Unfinished Teaching and Learning, and the final is Transitioning to a Post-Pandemic World. The plan is under construction and feedback has been received and will continue to be taken, but the hiccup is that schools will have to figure out how to sustain current programs based on the current state budget.

The proposed plan for federal money includes several items that will impact schools’ ability to handle the pandemic response in the future, and items that will improve the use of technology for all of our students and staff. For example, with regards to HVAC, the current proposed plan includes replacing our HVAC systems at Lakeview and E.W. Luther Schools with more powerful equipment that will increase the air-filtration system effectiveness, allow for mechanical automation and, last but not least, provide conditioned air to all rooms. This item alone has a big price tag, and the impact will be far reaching. With regards to technology, we have upgraded the capacity of our firewall and purchased software and devices that will be leveraged throughout upcoming school years.

Our schools have learned a lot through this pandemic, and will leverage that learning to promote greater opportunities for our students. There is a lot of work to do, and we know how to do it. Thanks to the federal government for stepping up and providing some one-time support; it is greatly appreciated and our students will get great benefits from it. If no additional action is taken at the state level, school districts across Wisconsin will face significant challenges when the federal funding expires.

The District will continue to monitor the prevalence of COVID-19 in the community and our schools and take the appropriate measures to keep our student athletes and coaches safe. **Boys' and Girls' Cross Country:** This is Coach Stan Druckrey's 50th year as cross country coach for the Rockets. The Rocket Invite will be named after Coach



Druckrey to celebrate the many years he devoted to sharing his passion of running. This year's team is a young one with many new faces after graduating several seniors.

**Boys' Soccer:** Much like the cross country team, many seniors graduated last year. This year's team features 2 returning

all-conference players and additional young and talented players.
